

## Custody

Please indicate to us the custody status of your child. A copy of the custody documents should be on file in the office if one parent has sole custody. We will assume that custody is joint unless we have documentation stating otherwise. Children will not be released from school to persons other than the parents who have custody unless written notification is given. Please ensure that you send a note with your child if special arrangements for the day are being made (e.g. a grandparent or neighbour is picking up your child.) If an early pick up is required, please contact the office.

## **Technology**



Technology is a wonderful thing! If your child has a device, e.g. a phone, an iPod etc. it needs to be kept at home or turned off and in the appropriate storage bin at school. Students in grades 4-6 are asked to hand over their devices at the beginning of the day, place them in their class bin and then stored safely in the office. In case of emergency, you can always call the office at 905-725-4232. Students should not be texting you during the day. Please help us out with this, thanks.

## **Registration Forms**

You will need your child's OEN number (found on the top of the first page of their report cards). You do this by logging on to the Parent Portal. Instructions can be found on the DDSB website.



## **Agenda**

Agendas have been ordered for all students in grades JK-Grade 6. They are expected to arrive in the next two weeks. Our grade 7 and 8 students are using different tools for organization, so please check with your child in intermediate to ensure they have something to record important information that can work as a successful form of communication between home and school. The agenda contains the School Code of Behaviour, a plastic communication envelope and weekly calendars to encourage student organization. Teachers will be using the agendas to assist with student organization as well as to communicate upcoming assignments, tests, class trips, etc. Please check your child's agenda nightly for homework or comments from the teacher, sign the agenda to indicate that you have had the chance to read it and ensure your child returns it each day to school. Please review the School Handbook/Code of Behaviour. The information contained in this handbook will be useful throughout the school year. It is included in the front part of the agenda.

## **Anaphylaxis, Allergies and Other Medical Conditions**



Our school board has a policy in place to help protect children with life-threatening allergies. If you are the parent of a child with a life-threatening allergy, we need your cooperation in providing the school with current medical information and assistance in developing a plan to protect your child's health. When that plan is in place, we will be asking for the cooperation of all parents and students in the school to help protect the allergic child from danger.

#### **Administration of Medication at School**

If your child requires the administration of medication while at school or has a severe allergy requiring the use of an EpiPen, please contact the school immediately so that we can provide you with the appropriate paperwork to be completed and develop a safety plan for your child together. Staff members cannot administer oral medication unless a "Request for Administration of Medication" is completed and signed by the parent/guardian and the prescribing doctor. These forms are available at the office. Medication should be dropped off at the school by the parent, not sent with the child. It needs to be in the proper container with instructions clearly labelled.

#### **SCHOOL ALLERGY AND ANAPHYLAXIS PLAN**

Many children have allergies. A few, however, are life-threatening. Some children, for example, are severely allergic to peanut products, including peanut butter. Even a tiny bit can be fatal within minutes. Nuts, eggs, soy, fish, shellfish, wheat, milk, sesame seeds and sulphites are also known to cause severe reactions.

#### **Peanuts and Nut Products**

Please check your child's lunch and snack items for items containing peanuts and nut products. We have students at our school who have anaphylactic reactions to peanuts/nuts this year. We are asking parents to avoid sending lunches and/or snacks which contain peanuts, nuts, peanut butter or peanut oils. Even "Wow butter" can trigger an anaphylactic response. We understand that this may be inconvenient, but it is extremely serious and is a life or death situation for some students. For the safety of all students we appreciate your support.

With your help, we will do our best to prevent mishaps and to make sure that all of our students are safe, healthy, and able to concentrate on learning.



## **Durham District School Board Gifted Program**

The purpose of this letter is to inform you that the Durham District School Board offers the option of self-contained gifted classes for identified intellectually gifted students beginning at the Grade 4 level at host elementary and secondary schools throughout the region. The core curriculum as determined by the Ontario Ministry of Education remains the same, but the teaching methods are differentiated to meet the needs of the gifted learner. The self-contained programme has been carefully designed to meet the strengths, needs, learning styles and interests of the gifted learner.

The Ontario Ministry of Education defines giftedness as "an unusually advanced degree of general intellectual ability that requires differentiated learning experiences of a depth and breadth beyond those normally provided in the regular programme to satisfy the level of educational potential indicated."

The DDSB offers a screening of the CCAT for students in Grades 3 or higher. Our process begins with nominations in September. Parents, guardians and educators are invited to nominate students in Grade 3 or above. In October and November, students who have been nominated will undergo an intellectual assessment using a cognitive abilities test called the CCAT, which is administered by the Special Education Resource Teacher (S.E.R.T.) in a group setting in your learner's current home school. Parents/guardians will receive a *brief* written report describing the results of this testing in December.

The DDSB offers three different parent/guardian information nights where the facilitator for Gifted Programming will do a short presentation and answer any questions you may have regarding the screening process. Please be aware that you may nominate your student in grade three or any subsequent grade. Students may take the test with the DDSB no more than twice. If you are not interested in nominating your child this year, please simply indicate on the Nomination Form that you do not wish to participate in the testing and return it to your child's teacher.

Please complete the nomination form and return to your child's teacher or SERT no later than September 30th.

#### **September 7- Ukrainian Heritage Day**

The first official Ukrainian immigrants, Vasyl Eleniak and Ivan Pylypiw, arrived in Canada on September 7, 1891. Soon afterwards, Ukrainian immigrants began arriving in Ontario in larger numbers and today Ontario is home to more than 336,000 Ukrainian Canadians. There are over 1.2 million Canadians of Ukrainian descent across the country.

Many Ukrainians fled their homeland to find freedom from oppression and a better life in Canada. Both Ontario and Canada, by way of the *Holodomor Memorial Day Act*, 2009 and the *Ukrainian Famine and Genocide ("Holodomor") Memorial Day Act* (Canada), have recognized the genocide by famine that occurred in Ukraine from 1932 to 1933 under the Soviet Communist regime of Joseph Stalin. On August 24, 1991, the Ukrainian parliament declared Ukraine as an independent democratic state from the Soviet Union. Canada was the first nation in the Western world to recognize Ukraine's independence.

Ontarians of Ukrainian descent have left and continue to leave a historic mark on our province. Their contributions span communities across Ontario and are reflected in our economic, political, social and cultural life. Ukrainian Canadians have played an important role in the development of Ontario into one of the most desirable places in the world to live and have contributed to making Canada the great country that it is today. It is important to recognize and celebrate these contributions.

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#### September 21 - International Day of Peace (UN)

2019 Theme: "Climate Action for Peace"

The theme draws attention to the importance of combatting climate change as a way to protect and promote peace throughout the world.

Climate change causes clear threats to international peace and security. Natural disasters displace three times as many people as conflicts, forcing millions to leave their homes and seek safety elsewhere. The salinization of water and crops is endangering food security, and the impact on public health is escalating. The growing tensions over resources and mass movements of people are affecting every country on every continent.

On 23 September, the United Nations is convening a Climate Action Summit with concrete and realistic plans to accelerate action to implement the Paris Agreement. The Summit will focus on the heart of the problem – the sectors that create the most emissions and the areas where building resilience could make the biggest difference – as well as provide leaders and partners the opportunity to demonstrate real climate action and showcase their ambition.

In the lead up to the International Day of Peace on 21 September, the United Nations calls upon all to take action to tackle climate change. Every human is part of the solution - from turning off the lights to taking public transport, to organizing an awareness raising campaign in your community. #### <u>September 25 - Franco-Ontarian Day (Ontario)</u>

Effective April 26, 2010, the Franco-Ontarian Day Act adopted by the Legislative Assembly of Ontario proclaims September 25 of each year as Franco-Ontarian Day. This Day will, every year, officially recognize the contribution of Ontario's Francophone community to the cultural, historical, social, economic and political life of the province. September 25 will commemorate the anniversary of the first raising of the Franco-Ontarian Flag in 1975.

#### September 23-27 - Ally Week

Ally Week is a national <u>youth-led</u> effort encouraging students to be allies with the LGBT (<u>lesbian</u>, <u>gay</u>, <u>bisexual</u> and <u>transgender</u>) members of their community in standing against <u>bullying</u>, <u>harassment</u> and name-calling. It takes place in <u>K-12 schools</u> and colleges. It was created by Joe Montana and other youth members of the Gay Lesbian & Straight Education Network <u>GLSEN</u> National JumpStart Student Leadership Team. It is done in the same spirit as <u>Day of Silence</u> to educate on anti-LGBT+ harassment issues.

The goal of Ally Week is to diminish stereotypes and exclusion while highlighting that peer support for LGBT+ students is stronger than the students themselves may have thought existed. In a survey of 240 undergraduates regarding what peer support they felt LGBT+ students had, research found that their personal attitudes were significantly more positive than they thought their friends and fellow students held. Allies are identified as supporters but not necessarily members of a marginalized group.

During Ally Week people are encouraged to sign an ally pledge "taking a stand for a safe and harass-ment-free school for all students", and that they will not use anti-LGBT+ language and slurs, they will intervene if possible to stop bullying and harassment and support safer schools efforts.

The word Ally is a verb as well as a noun. Action is a very important part of being an Ally, and the way in which support is shown for various members of the LGBT community can differ. It is important to seek information and have conversations to support your work.

September 23 also marks Bi-visibility Day.



## <u>September 30 – Orange Shirt Day (First Nations Canada)</u>

Assembly of First Nations (AFN) National Chief Ghislain Picard is encouraging people across the country to mark Orange Shirt Day each year on September 30, as a day to recognize the experience of former students of Indian Residential Schools and affirm a collective commitment to ensure that every child matters. Orange Shirt Day is an outcome of the St. Joseph Mission Residential School Commemoration Project and Reunion events that took place in Williams Lake, BC in May 2013. It stems from a story told by former residential school student, Phyllis Webstad, who had her new orange shirt, bought by her grandmother, taken from her as a six-year old girl. She spoke powerfully of how it seemed to her that nobody cared and, in this personal way, it speaks to the many harms experienced by children in the residential schools. The AFN asks all Canadians to join First Nations in wearing an orange shirt on September 30<sup>th</sup> in the spirit of healing and reconciliation.
